Charles Edward Briere



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Mayor Charles Edward Briere, son of Mrs. Louise (Pelter) Brier, was born in Wisconsin Rapids, February 2, 1884. He was graduated from the Howe High School with the class of 1902. The following year he taught in the country school in the Pagel district.

In the fall of 1903 he entered the State University at Madison as a law student from where he finished the course with the class of 1906, receiving the degree of LL. B. On August 1, 1906 he entered the profession of law, opening an office in the second story of the Bank of Grand Rapids, where he continued his practice until January 1, 1907, when he associated himself with the firm of Goggins and Brazeau. The firm was conducted for four years under the name of Goggins, Brazeau and Briere. and Brier

Elected Alderman

He was elected alderman from the third ward in which office he served during the years of 1908 and 1909. In the fall of 1909 he was elected to the office of district attorney at which time he severed connections with Goggins and Brazeau and opened up a law office in the second story of the Wood Countries.

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During his service as district attorney the records show seventy-five per cent of all criminal cases tried in circuit court. The most notorious case tried during his terms was the Beardsley murder case. Mr. Briere was instrumental in securing a written confession from the young criminal, Mortimer Wilson, which result-




City Attorney
In the year 1915 and 1916 under J. A. Cohen's second administration, Briere was appointed city attorney, serving in that office for two years. In the fall of 1918 he was elected to succeed E. W. Ellis as mayor and in 1920 was reeleted to the same office without opposition. His second term will expire in April, 1922. Under his terms of office as mayor; the following improvements have been added to the city: The new East Side fire station; the establishment of a paid fire department; the purchase of the fire truck which has a pump attached with a capacity of 750 gallons of water per minute; a drain ditch to relieve the fifth and sixth wards from water which filled basements of all buildings every spring.
